POLICY

Policy Highlight of the Month

The University of California 4-H Youth Development Program is a major effort and central to the mission of the University of California Cooperative Extension. Because of this effort and its position with the University, the Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources has overall responsibility for the development, efficiency and effectiveness of the 4-H Youth Development Program.

4-H units and councils (when authorized by the issuance of a 4-H Charter) are granted certain privileges and responsibilities related to financial activities. All monies raised and managed by 4-H units must be done so in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and within the policies and procedures specified by the 4-H Handbook (4-H Policy Manual). The policy extends to funds generated in the name of 4-H by the adult volunteers, parents/guardians and members of al 4-H units and councils.

All monies raised under the guise of 4-H and with the use of the name and emblem are to be treated according these established policies. Council treasurers and 4-H staff are responsible for ensuring that units comply, with the County Director having the final local authority on fundraising and club unit funds.

Record Books - What Are They?

In the 4-H Youth Development Program, there are many long-standing traditions, and we may not know why we do them, or where they came from. 4-H youth members are encouraged to keep written records and documentation of their events and activities and submit them annually with a special green cover that says, "Member Record."

This year, many of the 4-H Record Book Forms can be downloaded, filled-out on-line, edited, and saved on your computer for future work! This is an exciting change, and you can visit the new "Record Books Resources" website to download the forms you will need: http://www.recordbookresources.com/index.html.

For those new leaders and members who are new to Record Books, you might be wondering some of the following:

What is a Record Book?

4-H Record Books are an important form of keeping a written record/summary throughout the year of project work, events and activities, community service and overall learning and participation in the 4-H Youth Development Program. They are submitted for judging and competition at the Club, County level, and sometimes at the State level.

Why do a Record Book?

Record Books are a great way for members to reflect on what they have learned in many areas of their 4-H experience. It makes us look back on the year and say, "Hey, look at all I have accomplished!" Over the years, our record books give us an extensive full picture of commitment, achievement and success in a job well done. Completing a Record Book also helps teach us:

- Personal skills in financial management
- Personal accountability
- Record useful information
- Preserve our fun memories of our 4-H experience
- Provides a tool to share with others
- Helps us plan what we would like to do/accomplish in the next year
- Learn about planning and goal setting
- Learn how to document in a complete manner
- Will be a great tool when applying for college, jobs or scholarships

When do I start my Record Book?

You should start keeping your records at the beginning of each 4-H year (July 1-June 30) and continue to do so all year long.

Where can I get a Record Book cover?

You can order an official Record Book Cover at the 4-H Mall at: http://www.4-hmall.org/Catalog/SearchResults.aspx?SearchQuery=record+book+cover.

• You can also use your own plain, 2-pronged cover (ACCO) which you can find at a nearby stationery store (although the official 4-H cover is preferred).

What are the key elements in a Record Book?

- Personal Development Report
- 4-H Story
- Project Record Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- Supplemental Materials (photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)

What are some Helpful Hints for a Good Record Book?

- Make sure to visit the State 4-H Website to download forms at: http://www.recordbookresources.com/index.html.

- Include photos of you doing what you have mentioned in your Record Book.
- Write captions under the photos explaining what you are doing.
- Write as neatly as you can-- typing would be even better! Now that the Record Book Forms are online you can type on the forms and save them on-line. http://www.recordbookresources.com/windows-how-to.html.
- Document club and project events right after they occur (each month) so that they will be fresh in your mind.
- Include a title page, table of contents and tabs if you really want to impress the judges!

Can Primary Members (members age 5-8) turn in a Record Book?

Yes, to their Community Club Leader. Included in a Primary Record Book should be:

- A Primary Personal Development Report
- A Project Report Form for a Primary Project (listing the things they were involved in)

*Primary Record Books do not compete at the County level as Primary competition is prohibited. They are only reviewed by the Community Club Leader. Primary Record Books are a great tool in which to start the practice of keeping records.

Will there be a workshop to learn more about Record Books?

When are Record Books due?

Record Books are due to the County Office on Tuesday, September 13, 2011 by 4:00 p.m. or by 9:00 p.m. to an Incentives & Recognition Committee Member on Wednesday, September 14, 2011.

If members of my club are turning in Record Books, do I have to help judge other clubs' Record Books?

Yes. If you have any members in your club turning in a Record Book, a club volunteer must sign up for one of the following two Record Book Judging Dates with **Noel Keller**, *Incentives & Recognition Committee Chai*r at Noel Keller@hmc.edu. No more than three volunteers from the same club on any given day, please.

The dates are still being determined by the Incentives & Recognition Committee. Dates to follow.

How do I compete on the State level with my Record Book?

It is not necessary to turn your book in to the County first, but it is good practice. The Los Angeles County Incentives and Recognition Committee will review your book and provide suggestions if you turn it in to them by a specified date (still being determined by the Incentives & Recognition Committee). You must be a Senior 4-H Member (14-19 as of January 1, 2011). State Record Books must include:

- State Cover Page
- Personal Development Report
- 4-H Story
- Project Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- Supplemental Materials (including photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)
- Junior Teen Leadership Report

Senior (State) Record Books should demonstrate outstanding achievement in:

- Project Work
- Life Skills Development
- Leadership & Citizen Development

We hope to see many wonderful Record Books turned in this year, and see all that you have accomplished, as well as the fun you have had this program year. If your Mom and Dad were in 4-H, maybe they still have their Record Books for you to peruse. Keeping records and putting together your Record Books are a very important part of the 4-H Program, and how proud you will feel when it is all done!

Auction "Ear"

Two dollar bid, now three, now three, will ya' give me three? Sound familiar? For many of us who have sold a 4-H livestock project at the fair, or even for those who have attended a livestock auction, we can hear the auctioneer's rhythmic call in our heads long after the auction has come to a close. Fair memories for me always include the sound of the auctioneer's voice and excitedly watching the bidders in the audience raise their number paddles while I paraded my lamb around the show ring. **April 16, 2011**, is *National Auctioneer's Day*, and we celebrate the art of auctioneering-- not only on one of the last days of the fair, but year-round!

An auction is the act of buying or selling goods or services through a series of "bids" (financial offers). An "auctioneer" runs an auction by introducing the item for sale and calling out the bids from low to high, while coordinating verbally the bids that are made at an exceptionally fast pace. This speedy talking, while selling, is referred to as "chanting," "bid calling" or an "auction cry." Auctioneers include the use of slurring "filler words" (extra words or phrases such as "will ya' give me") which help to speed along and invigorate the sale. Professional "Ringmen" frequently work side-by-side with auctioneers and assist the auctioneer in spotting bids. It is the intention of the auctioneer to sell all the livestock during one session.

The auctioneers conducting the auction must have a full knowledge of the goods they are trying to sell, and in the case of 4-H Livestock Projects, this would be livestock. Auctioneers are usually funny, have excellent voices, are quick-witted, and usually really enjoy what they do. In addition to being entertainers, auctioneers are salesmen that while being fun and friendly, follow a strict code of ethics and are depended on for a speedy, accurate sale while pleasing those involved with the sale.

Since auctioneering is not a skill that can be obtained overnight, there are special schools dedicated to the art of auctioneering (although attending a school is not mandatory). Texas, North Carolina, Missouri, Ohio, Indiana, Montana, Iowa and even California (along with a number of other states), have schools dedicated to such programs! Interestingly enough, their course training often involves finance, accounting, management, psychology, public speaking and marketing. Various states often require auctioneer licenses and apprenticeships (working alongside and mirroring experienced auctioneers). Well-trained and licensed auctioneers may often have careers based in sales, real estate, marketing, accounting and more.

Many states hold "Livestock Auctioneering Competitions," and there is an even larger "World Livestock Auctioneering Competition" held annually, and this year will be held **June 23-25, 2011,** in Greenville and Williamston, South Carolina. Livestock Auctioneers have been featured in films (*What Am I Bid*, 1967, *How Much Wood Would a Woodchuck Chuck*, 1976, *Cattle Call*, 2008). There was also a song written to honor auctioneers, funnily enough called "**The Auctioneer**" by Leroy Van Dyke in 1956.

Whether you are involved in a 4-H livestock project or not, it would be interesting to attend an auction in your area just to see what it is like. After attending an auction, you may have your interest peaked to find out more

about this special skill. You may feel like you have an Auction "Ear" and would one day like to give it a try. Read on to find out more in *Interview with an Auctioneer: James Backman...* maybe you will be "Sold!" on the art of auctioneering.

Interview with an Auctioneer: James Backman

James Backman of Denair, California, is an Auctioneer and a Swine Farmer...and an ex-4-Her and FFA (Future Farmers of America) member. I had the opportunity to interview him on his auctioneering career and learned a great deal about auctioneering from a true professional!

James grew up in the Central Valley on his family's farm where they grew alfalfa, oats, corn, and raised Dairy Heifers. His early years were spent working on the farm, going to school, participating in 4-H, and spending cherished time at auctions. One of his favorite pastimes was going to the livestock auctions at his local fair, but also to sales yards for cattle and farm equipment auctions. Hours spent at these auctions and listening to the call of the auctioneers ignited a spark that would one day become a great passion of his.

James now runs his own swine farm full time (**Backman Swine Farm**), and auctioneers for fun in his spare time. He is the Lead Auctioneer for the California Pork Producers and is a big supporter of both 4-H and FFA.

Here is what James had to say:

What made you want to become an Auctioneer?

As a kid growing up on a farm and in the 4-H Program, I spent a lot of time at auctions. I always found them very entertaining. I often went to sales yards for cattle and equipment auctions and decided it was something I might like to do one day. It was very natural for me.

Did you have auctioneer mentors who inspired you?

I did. Max Olivera (who began auctioneering at 8 years old) and Ralph Wade, both of the Central Valley. I learned a lot from them, and they are really good at what they do.

How old were you when you first began auctioneering, and what was your first auction like?

I was 22, and it was really BAD! The scheduled auctioneer didn't show up that day, and there was a call to the audience for someone "who wanted to give it a try." I volunteered, and it was a mess! I was in college at Fresno State at the time and had only done a few club pig and club lambs sales during that time period. I did "give it a try," and it has turned out to be something that I really like doing after all.

How long have you been auctioneering?

For 15 years. It has been a lot of fun.

Did you go to a special school to become an Auctioneer?

I did. I went to the *World Champion School of Auctioneering* in Bakersfield, California. I learned a lot and was able to really work on my rhythm, flow and chant.

How do you judge if you are doing a good job auctioneering, or, what makes it a good day of auctioneering for you?

It's like any job really—you feel like "Yeah, that was good," or maybe, not so good! When I get a good rhythm and a good flow, everything just seems right. When you are on the block, there is a big crowd, and animals are selling (although there really is no controlling that aspect)—then it is a good day. When "things are crackin," I can feel it, and it just feels right.

How often do you practice and where?

I don't practice as often as I should, but when I do, it is always when I am driving. I like to practice by myself, especially on long drives. Also, it comes back to me when I am working an auction.

What is your favorite part of auctioneering?

I guess it's a constant fascination with the act of auctioning. The more I get to do it, the more I love it. Setting the pace of a sale, seeing and being around all of the livestock, getting better at what I do with each auction, and interacting with the crowd all make each auction an exciting event.

What advice would have for 4-Hers that might be interested in pursuing a career in auctioneering?

Practice! Attend as many auctions as you can. Go to different auctions in different places. Listen! Talk to the auctioneers. Ask them questions. Ask auctioneers for advice on rhythm, patterns, the fundamentals, and about their personal experiences. Try and find an auctioneer mentor to help guide you. As with anything, practice hard, if this is something you really want to do.

Where can we go to hear you auctioneer?

Most auctions I do are in the Central Valley. I auction at the Stanislaus County Fair each year, and at events the California Pork Producers are involved with, and all over. Recently, I did an auction in Nipomo and also in Oregon. I like to do it as much as I can.
