

MASTER TREE LIST for the CITY of STOCKTON

Small Trees – under 30 feet high

These trees are suitable for use in small tree wells (3ft. X 3ft. or 4ft. X 4ft.), in narrow (2 to 3 feet wide) park strips (area between curb and sidewalk), in small front yards, or underneath power lines (with approval from utility company only).

Medium Trees – 30 feet to 60 feet high

These trees are suitable for most average sized or large front yards, in larger park strips (5 feet or more wide), or in parks and greenbelts.

Large Trees – over 60 feet high

These trees are most suitable for larger areas such as parks, greenbelts, or large front yards with no overhead obstructions.

TREES NOT APPROVED FOR STREET TREE PLANTING

Any tree with fruit, or undesirable seeds, cones or nuts not listed above. Any tree with a voracious, shallow root system that is known to cause sidewalk or driveway damage, or any tree with an uncontrollable pest (disease, insect or invertebrate) problem will not be allowed. Any tree not listed above without prior consent.
