2018-2019 State 4-H Program Fees

4-H is the first and largest youth development organization in the world, and for over 100 years has been preparing young people ages 5 to 19 with the skills they need to lead for a lifetime. Annual program fees paid by members and volunteers help support fundamental services, including staff, insurance, program development, resources, events, and required online systems to sustain and enhance exceptional programming for nearly 110,000 members and 15,500 adult volunteers. Over the coming years, state program fees are projected to increase to cover the usual costs for program operations.

For the 2018-2019 program year, starting July 1, 2018, fees will be \$54 for youth and \$18 for adult volunteers. Counties and clubs may also have a separate fee. We believe that 4-H should be accessible to everyone and, therefore, fee waivers will continue to be available for qualifying families (contact the local County 4-H Office for more information). 4-H is still relatively inexpensive compared to other youth activities such as youth football or soccer (which start at several hundred dollars a season). And, youth who participate in 4-H are more likely to excel in school, participate and be interested in science, make more healthy choices, contribute to their communities and thrive today and in the future.

The University of California, Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources administers 4-H and provides significant support to cover operational costs, including funding for nearly half of all county-based staff positions and all Advisor positions. The State 4-H Office will continue to raise funds to help alleviate projected increases and develop new revenue streams to support 4-H in order to keep costs *as low as possible* for families.

Steps to Becoming a Leader

- ✓ Determine your club and meet with your Community Club Leader
- ✓ Complete Ca4honline enrollment
- ✓ Complete Livescan background check
- ✓ Complete eXtension trainings
- ✓ Pay leader fees of \$18.00 to club (some clubs cover leader fees)
- ✓ Conduct a minimum of 6 hours of instruction through project group meetings, workshops, field trips, etc.
- ✓ Involve experienced Junior/Teen leaders in projects.
- ✓ Make a one year commitment to the project group.

New Year Enrollment Opens July 2, 2018

Leaders – please encourage members to complete ca4honline <https://ca.4honline.com/> enrollment soon after the kick off of the new program year beginning July 2, 2018. All members exhibiting at fall fairs must be enrolled, paid, confirmed, and activated prior to fairs. The County 4-H Office will be asked to validate all participants. Members not activated in the system 2 weeks prior to fairs may be disqualified as exhibitors.

Families – please note you MUST LOG IN TO EXISTING FAMILY PROFILES when enrolling. Duplicate accounts create time consuming administrative issues. If you are unable to log in to your existing family profile, please contact the 4-H Office for assistance (559) 241-7515.

Adult Volunteers – Great news regarding the online training courses. The State 4-H Office has revised the courses and shortened the length considerably. For “Returning Volunteers” course time dropped from 1 ½ hours to 30 minutes. For the “New Volunteers” it dropped from 3 hours to 2 ½. 1. Complete ca4honline enrollment
2. Club must confirm based on payment of fees
3. Adults must complete the mandatory online training courses
4. Livescan (fingerprints) required on all new volunteers
5. County office activates once ALL steps completed. You CANNOT hold project meetings until activated.

Record Books 2018



Club Record Book judging should be completed during the month of July. Please access the “Club Evaluation Form” here <http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/243563.pdf> Remember members must complete the APR at minimum to be eligible for the service strip and year pin.

County Record Book judging will take place Saturday, August 4th at Fairmont Elementary School- 3095 N. Greenwood Ave., Sanger (just west of Shields and Academy Ave) Books will be due to 4-H Office Friday, Aug. 3rd by 5:00 pm. Remember all clubs MUST SEND 1 JUDGE FOR EVERY 5 BOOKS SUBMITTED. We will begin at 8:30 am and hope to complete books by 3:00 pm. With a sufficient number of judges present we may finish much sooner. Encourage parents, leaders, and Sr. members to participate.

About 4-H Record Books

The 4-H program has a long history of record keeping. The focus reflects the importance of this life skill in our daily lives. Completing a 4-H Record Book is a process where you record project and club work using a standard format.

Why have 4-H Record Books?

Completing the Personal Development Report in the Record Book provides you an incentive for participation, learning, and achievement. This must be completed to earn star ranks. The Annual Project Report must be completed to be eligible for fair participation. *To clarify the requirements for record books, any member showing animals at the Fresno Fair, applying for a star rank award, or obtaining service stripes and pins MUST COMPLETE A RECORD BOOK.*

Benefits of completing a 4-H Record Book:

Practice Records Management - Track your activities, events, profits and losses, skill development and learning experiences. In this competency skill you identify, create, classify, archive and preserve records.

- **Reflect on your yearly work** - Document your skill development and learning experiences in a written report.
- **Measure your achievements and growth throughout your years in 4-H.**
- **Set goals, pursue strategies to meet those goals, and record how you may have had to shift gears in the face of challenges and obstacles.**

State Record Book Judging will be held in October, however the deadline for the “Intent to Submit” form is August 31st, 2018. The link for 2018 State Intent forms can be found here:

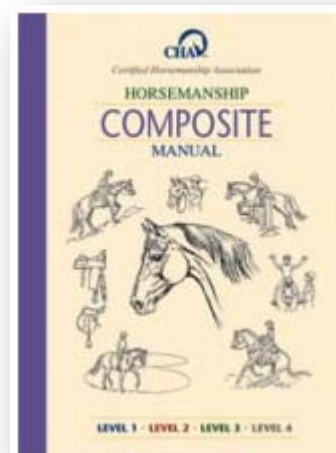

LAMBS AND GOATS MUST HAVE PROPER SCRAPIE ID. IN THE ANIMALS EAR FOR MANDATORY EAR TAGGING NO EXCEPTIONS. NO DIRTY SHEEP OR GOATS (fungus, sore-mouth, other communicable diseases) WILL BE TAGGED DURING MANDATORY EAR TAGGING. ADVISORS LEADERS, AND PARENT ADVISORS MUST MAKE RESERVATION WITH THE FAIR.

4-H Fair Market Sheep & Goat Show



Attention Sheep and Goat Exhibitors

We are happy to offer the 4-H Sheep and Goat show again at the Fresno Fairgrounds on Saturday, July 21, 2018. This is in conjunction with the NEW MANDATORY ear tagging for the Fresno Fair. **New this year- Dairy Goat Showmanship (non-market)**. No dairy breeding classes. We will have market sheep (which will include a whiteface and a blackface division). We also offer market goats (which will include a boer goat and a dairy market goat division) Boer and dairy markets will show together in showmanship only while non-market dairy will have their own showmanship. The show will begin at 9:00 a.m. — This will be a “Dry Show” meaning all animals must be washed and groomed before they arrive. Sheep and Goats will show at the same time - in different rings. Bring shovels, rakes, and pitchforks. All areas must be cleaned prior to leaving.

NOTE: All market animals must be tagged with the Fresno Fair Market Tag.

No breeding animals to be shown (other than showmanship).

Please contact the fair to make your appointment for ear tagging. (appointments are required). If you are exhibiting in the Market Show, you must tag prior to 9:00 am. Entries & registration will be submitted day of the event. **No pre-entries required.** Fees \$2.00 per Class, including Showmanship. For questions please contact Teri Penfold at (209) 404-4538.
