- Address fire resilience.
- Adopt best practices in pest management.

Educational Outreach

We connect one-on-one with community members through our Information Desk online and at the UCCE Sonoma office, our presence at local Farmers Markets, workshops, lectures, and home visits through our nationally recognized Garden Sense program. Increasingly, our offerings are multilingual.

We have demonstration gardens located around Sonoma County that showcase best practices in sustainable landscaping and food production. UCMGSC also focuses on food security in partnership with several community gardens.

Sonoma Garden Park Children's Garden

Sonoma Garden Park Children's Garden is a vibrant classroom where children explore nature through hands-on gardening and sustainability. For 18 years, Master Gardeners have inspired over 1,000 students and families annually, fostering a love for the environment and healthier lifestyles.

One of our proudest moments last year was the Annual Harvest Festival. This event gathered roughly 300 attendees, mostly young families, to celebrate the garden's bounty and connect with the community. Events included free activities like crafts, cider pressing, scarecrow-making, and birdhouse-building, creating an afternoon of learning and joy for all ages, promoting healthy eating and environmental stewardship.

Children's gardens are more than just plots of land; they're gateways to knowledge, health, and community. With your support, we can continue to cultivate these invaluable resources for our children.

The Children's Garden at the UC Master Gardener Demonstration and Teaching Garden - Los Guilicos

The Children's Garden at Los Guilicos has blossomed into a thriving hub of learning and community engagement. Designed to empower children through hands-on experiences in nature, this garden serves as an educational space where young learners can connect with the environment, cultivate new skills, and nurture their curiosity.

It also serves as a safe haven for vulnerable children at the Valley of the Moon Children's Center (VMCC), allowing them to find solace and healing in nature while enjoying access to healthy, fresh produce. We have delivered over 300 pounds of fresh produce to VMCC.

During 2024, we debuted a field trip program at the Children's Garden for underserved youth in elementary schools across the County based on lessons and activities tied to Next Generation Science Standards. The field trips are so popular, we have schools signed up through Fall 2025.

"The impact on visiting students is evidenced by the heartfelt thank-you notes received from students after their field trips," says Master Gardener Pat Decker, Children's Garden project leader. "Many children share specific details about what they learned—from the intricacies of soil health to the joys of planting seeds."



UC Master Gardener Program awarded 'Unprecedented' grant





During a December 10, 2024, Sonoma County Board of Supervisors meeting, the UC Master Gardener Program of Sonoma County received a \$1.046 million Sonoma County Ag + Open Space grant. The grant will support our work at the Los Guilicos Demonstration and Teaching Garden. "This grant is unprecedented in the entire history of the Master Gardener Program," says Missy Gable, Statewide Director of the UC Master Gardener Program.

The Los Guilicos Demonstration and Teaching Garden is a 4.5-acre parcel of land in east Santa Rosa near the Valley of the Moon Children's Center that was damaged during the 2020 Glass Fire. Since the spring of 2023, UC Master Gardener volunteers have transformed the property into a native, waterwise, firewise, and wildlife-friendly garden and learning space for adults and children. COLLABORATING with community gardens to improve food security

Petaluma Bounty Unity Garden

We're celebrating over three years of partnership with Petaluma Bounty, a local food security non-profit farm, with our Unity demonstration garden. Our Master Gardener team of volunteers transformed a weedinfested garden space into a wonderful hub of sustainable garden practices.

The team hosts seasonal hands-on workshops on topics such as successful spring planting, fruit tree pruning, container gardening, vegetables and pollinator plants, tool maintenance, children's activities and more. During 2024, the team reached over 400 community members through hands-on learning opportunities.

During 2024, Master Gardener volunteers received and planted a habitat kit from the Xerces Habitat Kit Program to create a habitat hedgerow. Harvest for the Hungry Garden

Founded in 1987, Harvest for the Hungry Garden is more than just a garden—it's a lifeline for those facing food insecurity in Sonoma County. By growing organic produce year-round, Harvest for the Hungry provides fresh, nutritious food to those who need it most, while fostering a sense of community and sharing the joys of gardening.

Master Gardeners have been involved since the beginning playing a vital role in establishing the garden and continuing to provide expert advice and hands-on learning experiences for visitors and volunteers. During 2024, nearly 20 food gardening education videos were filmed at the garden by Master Gardeners.

Beyond growing food, Harvest for the Hungry empowers the community with knowledge. Through annual workshops and seasonal videos, Sonoma County Master Gardeners share science-based gardening techniques helping individuals and families become more self-sufficient in producing their own food.

EMPOWERING adaptation to a changing climate



Sonoma County Master Gardener Adaptation and Resilience for Climate

The Sonoma County Master Gardener Adaptation and Resilience for Climate (ARC) study group, formed in June 2024, has been developing climate-related learning activities for kids.

The ARC study group hosted an insect hotel table at the Master Gardener Children's Jamboree and Fall Festival held at the Los Guilicos Demonstration and Teaching Garden in October 2024. Fifty bug hotels, which were wildly popular, were built by children who attended the event.

The ARC study group has also tackled learning more about climate resilient seeds, seed saving and hosted a seed saving workshop. In spring 2025 the ARC study group and our Food Gardening study group will host two neighborhood food gardening fairs. The purpose is to identify how Master Gardeners can help build resilience, food security and community.

Sonoma County Fair sustainable garden display

The UC Master Gardeners of Sonoma County and Sonoma-Marin Saving Water Partnership teamed up for a second year to create a sustainable garden display at the 2024 Sonoma County Fair.


Our focus was informing home gardeners about our free program, Garden Sense, which includes advice about water saving irrigation tips and plant selection. The climate ready landscape display of low water, mostly California native plants highlighted how home gardeners can invite native pollinators and birds to their garden while also having the garden look beautiful year-round.

The garden not only highlighted low water use plants but also featured ways to slow, spread and sink rainwater, and how to reduce landscape water use via smart irrigation controllers and drip irrigation.

Master Gardeners staffed the garden display at the fair over 10 days and enjoyed sharing the rewards of sustainable home gardening with over 600 Fair attendees.
